## **President's Message**

Recently an amendment was made to Section 413 of the New York Social Services Law (Chapter 193 of the Laws of 2007). This amendment clarifies who is a mandated reporter and therefore is responsible for reporting sus-

pected child abuse or maltreatment, via phone, to the Statewide Central Register for Child Abuse and Maltreatment. Mandated reporters or "school officials" include, but are not limited to: teachers, guidance counselors, psychologists, nurses, administrators, and any school personnel holding a license or certificate.

What does this change in law mean and how does it affect you? If you have reasonable cause to suspect child abuse or maltreatment, or have been given a disclosure of child abuse or maltreatment, you

must directly call the child abuse hotline. In the past it was counselor or possible for a teacher who had reasonable cause to inform their the form LDSS-2221A (Rev building support professionals (counselor, psychologist, social worker) or administrator who would then make the call. This

If you have reasonable cause to suspect child abuse or maltreatment, or have been given a disclosure of child abuse or maltreatment, you must directly call the child abuse hotline.

> is no longer the case. Failure to make this call yourself could result in you being charged with a class A misdemeanor and sued in civil court for monetary damages.

However it is still advisable to seek guidance or assistance from your school counselor, psychologist, or administrator. In fact the first step of this process is for you to go

to your school psychologist office and pick up 9/2007) Report of Suspected

Child Abuse or Maltreatment. This form must be completed and filed to your local child protective service within 48 hours of you making the call "oral report". The support professionals in your building can help walk you through this process. The address of your local child protective service and information regarding this form can also be obtained when you call to make the oral report. You must also immediately notify your building administrator that a call has been made as they are required to complete an internal report and are in charge of subsequent internal administration which may include providing addition follow up information to CPS.



Nothing has changed as far as what is classified as child abuse or maltreatment. What has changed is the procedure You may choose to have the support professionals walk you through this process. If you find yourself in a situation where you are not sure whether or not you have reasonable cause, the only resolution and answer to this question is for you to pick up the phone and call.

Your building counselor, psychologist, or administrator cannot make that decision for you. You must call, and child protective services will decide whether to take the case or not. Suspect Abuse or Maltreatment? **Report it Now!**

# **NEA Foundation Grants**

The NEA Foundation supports a variety of efforts by teachers, education support professionals, and higher education faculty and staff to improve student learning in the nation's public schools, colleges, and universities. The next application deadline is quickly approaching—February 1, 2008. Below are two categories of grants that WCSD staff can qualify for:

Learning & Leadership Grants: provide opportunities for teachers, education support professionals, and higher education faculty and staff to engage in high-quality professional development and lead their colleagues in professional growth. The grant amount is \$2,000 for individuals and \$5,000 for groups engaged in collegial study.

Student Achievement Grants: provide \$5,000 to improve the academic achievement of students by engaging in critical thinking and problem solving that deepen knowledge of standards-based subject matter. The work should also improve students' habits of inquiry, self-directed learning, and critical reflection. (These grants replace the Foundation's Innovation Grants program, which has been discontinued.)

This past year our very own Jen Spina received the learning and Leadership grant to participate in a competency-based school neuropsychological training program designed for school psychologists in order to provide support for elementary students who experience difficulties due to

learning disabilities, attention deficit hyperactive disorder, and brain trauma. Through direct instruction, group instruction, and field experience, Ms. Spina along with Anne Wigent are learning to administer, score, and interpret a variety of neuropsychological tests to evaluate individual children and how to utilize neuropsychological tools to identify areas of the brain responsible for facets of learning and tailor interventions to specific areas of the brain.
